Foster Park prevails again

Hall's Restaurants edges TinCaps for LL Invitational title in extra-innings

75 years later, a team from

Foster Park Little League, No. 1 Hall's Restaurants, ruled the District 10 Invitational Tournament.

In 1951, Foster Park was then known as Southwest. Fleetwing won the first title. Foster Park champion Hall's edged Georgetown

champ TinCaps 7-6 at Georgetown on Tuesday, June 17.

Halls shortstop/pitcher Diego LaFontaine dashed home from third with the winning run in the bottom of the seventh.

Hall's (18-5) won for the second time in three seasons guided by manager Thom McGuire. The *(Con't on Page 2)*

PFW strikes out baseball

This is the most distressing, disappointing news from the northeast Indiana collegiate baseball scene which you most likely all know about. Purdue Fort Wayne has discontinued baseball and softball in a stunning decision to save money.

PFW announced the decision in a release on Friday May 23. The decision, which includes an expected

cost savings of upwards of \$1 million, is directly related to \$6 million in budget cuts the university announced Thursday (May 22).

Purdue Fort Wayne remains fully committed to competing at the highest level of NCAA Division I athletics as a member of Horizon League and Midwestern Intercollegiate Volleyball Association. This decision is rooted in the responsibility to maintain a



stable, equitable, and high-quality athletics environment for all PFW student-athletes.

Senior leaders from the university and its Department of Intercollegiate Athletics are already working to assist those individuals who have

been affected by the discontinuation of the two programs.

"This is one of the saddest days in my 25 years as a Mastodon," Athletic Director Kelley Hartley *(Con't on Page 3)*

TinCaps (20-2) won the Georgetown LL crown in Dave Dabe's last season as manager.

TinCaps No. 11 batter Preston Ceasaretti knocked in Jackson Pressler (automatic runner) with the go-ahead run in the top of the seventh on a one-out groundout to second base for a 6-5 lead. Owen Fry moved Pressler to second with a sacrifice bunt. But that was the only run the TinCaps managed against the reliever LaFontaine.

LaFontaine came on with two outs and got a fly to left after the TinCaps scored four runs in the fifth to snap a tie at one, and take a 5-1 lead. He yielded a single to Emerson Riddenheim, but didn't allow another hit to earn the win.

Hall's bounced right back scoring three times in the bottom of the fifth. Millie McGuire, the only player on either team with more than one hit (2) led off with a double and eventually scored with a heads up play to steal home.

Nick Dowling walked and later scored on a wild pitch. Simon Schofield singled to left center with two outs. LaFontaine scored cutting the HR deficit to a run.

"Am I gonna make it, am I gonna make it, am I gonna make it," was running through LaFontaine's mind as he dashed home with the game-winning run for HR in the seventh. "I'm very happy. We just had to boost our energy," when the TCs took a four-run lead. "We stayed focused and persevered to the end."

Falling behind 5-1, Thom McGuire relied on recent history to inspire his team.

"Last Thursday we fell behind 6-1, got some runners on, came back and tied it in the sixth, then won in the seventh," McGuire said. "I just said the same thing today and our team took it to heart."

The trainer at the game said he didn't think Thom's daughter, Millie, broke anything, so she wiped away the tears and kept playing.

"She loves baseball, she's a strong girl," Thom observed.

"We've had such a great group of volunteers at Foster Park," McGuire continued. "I've been inspired by men who coached in the late 80s and early 90s -- Ed Lipneck, Tom Yoder, Bob Hall, Joe Carsten, Ed Murphy -- these are the legends of FP, and my high school coach Mark Redding.

"Some didn't even have kids playing. We looked up to them and now I see all the hard work they put in and the countless volunteer hours."

First 'star' of City LL championship recalls '51

Keith Pressler still gets a special twinkle in his eye when he recalls the first season of Little League baseball in Fort Wayne.

Pressler, now 86 years old, hit a two-run home run in the first inning, went 3-for-3 at the plate and pitched a complete-game four-hitter in Fleetwing's 6-2 win over Superior Fuel in the first City Little League Tournament championship game in 1951.

That first year of Indiana District 10 baseball was also the first in Indiana making the Fort the first Little League program in the state. There were 16 teams in four leagues -- Southwest (Foster Park), Northwest (Hamilton Park), Southeast (Sacred Heart) and Northeast (St. Jude's).

Fleetwing won the Foster Park title while Superior Fuel was Northeast champ.

The four league champions comprised the first City Tournament field, which was conducted at Memorial Park.

"I remember the people watch-

ing the game were everywhere," Pressler told me along with his two sons -- Scott and Joe. "My catcher was Tommy Means and he kept me in check...I could be kinda wild," Keith said with a chuckle. "I might walk the first three and strikeout the next three. The fourth guy didn't wanna get hit."

"I remember it was just fun," Pressler said. "I played a lot of catch in the backyard with my dad (Harry Keith) and my grandpa drove me to some games."

Of course, he had a whistling fastball "but I really liked to throw my sidearm curve," the right-handed lifelong Cubs fan related.

Fleetwing, managed by Earl Bolyard, defeated Brouwer's Tire and Battery 12-2 on the one-hit pitching of Monte 'Beb' Gerig in the first semifinal game. Superior Fuel edged the favorite, Allen Dairy (Hamilton Park/Northwest champ), 9-8. AD's Bob Meister and SP's John Becker homered.

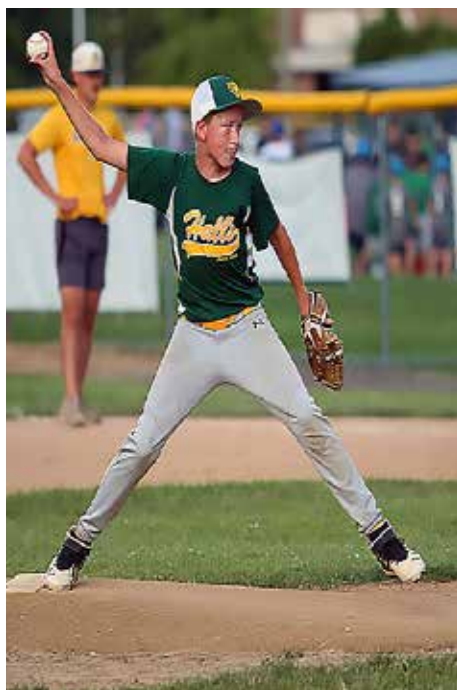

Steve Reed 1955-2025



NEIBA Hall of Fame member Steven "Steve" Edward Reed, 69, of Ossian, Indiana, passed away peacefully on Monday, August 11, 2025, at Stillwater Hospice, surrounded by family. Born on September 22, 1955, in Fort Wayne, the 1974 Wayne High School grad was selected by the Cincinnati Reds at No. 23 in the first round of the MLB June Amateur Draft.

Steve was part of Wayne High School's first baseball team in 1971-72, and helped the Generals win three consecutive Sectional titles. The right-hander was first-team All-City Team in 1972, 1973 and 1974. He was selected in the first round of the 1974 MLB June Draft by the Cincinnati Reds and went on to pitch four seasons in their minor league system. After a shoulder injury in 1977, he continued his career as a closer in the Milwaukee Brewers' organization. In recognition of his diamond accomplishments, Steve was inducted into the Northeast Indiana Baseball Association (NEIBA) Hall of Fame in 2005.

After his baseball career, Steve worked in sales. He was especially active in his grandchildren's sporting events and spent much of his free time outdoors—hunting, fishing, and relaxing by the river with his son and nephews.

Steve is survived by his wife, Julie Reed; daughter, Angie (Jimmy) Logan; son, Jason (Laura) Reed; brother, Rick (Helen) Reed; and six grandchildren. He also leaves behind several nieces, nephews, and extended family. He was preceded in death by his father, Jack Reed; mother, Martha "Jeanne" Reed; and brother, Michael Reed.

Celebration of Life will be held at 12:30 pm on Saturday, September 13, 2025, at Klaehn, Fahl, & Melton Funeral Home, 6424 Winchester Road, Fort Wayne, Indiana 46819, with visitation beginning at 11 am. In lieu of flowers, memorial contributions may be made to Wildcat Baseball or St. Jude Children's Hospital.
